Walyalup Kannajil COMMUNITY CHOIR

In early 2021 **Walyalup Kannajil** - led by Music Director Kobi Arthur Morrison and Coordinator Susie Waller - commenced a choir collaborations project with various choirs in the Walyalup-Fremantle and broader Boorloo-Perth areas - VoiceMale, Radujsja, The New Rechoirments and Chordial Tones.

The project involved Walyalup Kannajil sharing various songs from our repertoire, songs written primarily by local as well as national Aboriginal musicians, and inspired by local Noongar culture, history and language. Kobi shared his passion and love of his First Nations culture, including his culture of music, with each of the choirs. This entailed Kobi sharing an introduction to the Noongar Nation as well as Noongar language, and translating a song from each choirs' repertoire into Noongar and gifting it back to the respective choir, for them to learn and sing.

Tonight's performance is a celebration of these choir collaborations, of new friendships. We are very lucky to also be joined by two other choirs Kobi leads, Koondarm and Madjitil Moorna, the latter which he leads alongside his ngank (mum) Della Rae Morrison. Together the seven choirs will be coming together as Yedi Moort, Song Family, singing for you a kwobidak (beautiful) selection of songs. We hope that you will also join us in the singing of songs, and so welcome you to our Yedi Moort!

Walyalup Kannajil - translating as Fremantle in Truth - is an inclusive community choir based in Walyalup-Fremantle. Established in 2018, the choir is led by Bibbulmun Noongar and Singer-Songwriter, Kobi Arthur Morrison. The choir meets weekly on a Wednesday evening at the Fremantle PCYC in Hilton, and welcomes members of all ages, abilities and cultural backgrounds. We also welcome special guest Aboriginal Elders and musicians throughout the year. Together we aim to deepen our shared understanding of Noongar culture, history and language through song.
